#### HIGHLIGHTS: ISPP Policy Parliament SANSAD 2023

With great enthusiasm, the scholar-run flagship event, Sansad 2023, took off with a thoughtprovoking discussion on the topical theme: "Innovation, Digital Economy and Competition Concerns: What is the better trade-off for India?" Passionate teams from over 20 top educational institutions, alongside working professionals and think tanks in India, came together to deliberate and draft a model Digital Competition Bill which was directly shared with policymakers.

The event was nothing short of exceptional, featuring distinguished panelists including Mr. Shailesh Pathak (Secretary General, FICCI) as the Chief Guest, Mr. Sachin Goyal (Joint Director, Competition Commission Of India), Mr. Augustine Peter (Founder, AP Regulatory Law Practice and Former Member, CCI), Dr. Archana G. Gulati (Professor of Practice at ISPP and Former Joint Secretary, Digital Communications at the NITI Aayog), Prof. Krishna Ladha (Professor at ISPP), and Ms. Modhulika Bose (Counsel, P&A Law Offices).

Participants delved into the challenges and opportunities presented by India's dynamic digital economy, urging them to ponder on the ideal balance between fostering innovation and ensuring fair competition in this tech-driven era.







### HIGHLIGHTS: WOMEN IN PUBLIC POLICY

As part of ISPP's vision to democratise public policy education and engagement, we realise how crucial women's participation is in decision-making and leadership for achieving genderinclusive growth and governance. The aim is to encourage, attract, engage, educate, amplify and celebrate women in public policy through community engagement, promotional platforms, and education programmes to foster and encourage inclusive policymaking and governance.

As a first step to what could take the shape of a larger collective - 'WIPP - Women In Public

Policy", we organised our first dialogue series on the theme,

"Leading the Change: Women in Public Policy How far have we come? Where do we want to go?"

The audience participated in a thought-provoking discussion led by an illustrious panel of leading ladies in the policy space - Dr. Shamika Ravi (Member, Economic Advisory Council of the Prime Minister), Devanshi Vaid (Co-Founder, India Development Review), Sowmya Karun (Lead, Public Affairs at Google), Kanksshi Agarwal (Founder, Netri Foundation), Parikrama Chowdhry (Senior Policy Manager at J-PAL), Ayushi Gupta (Consultant, World Bank and Community Representative, Women in Economics & Policy), and Sumeet Sandhu (Head of Development at ISPP).



The comprehensive and engaging dialogue covered a host of topics, including the lack of basic facilities such as toilets in offices to higher-order issues such as building networking skills and opportunities, developing reading and analytical skills, and underutilisation of women in policy at the grassroots.

The panel also deliberated on significant challenges women continue to face in pursuing public policy careers and attaining high-level positions. Panelists emphasised the need for better representation of women in public policy which would lead to more effective and inclusive policies. Ways to encourage more young women to pursue public policy careers were also discussed. The discussion also highlighted the role intersectionality plays in women's experiences in public policy, and how it could be addressed.

#### **HIGHLIGHTS: Hosting The Behavioural Insights Team**


On June 24, ISPP hosted Mr. David Halpern from The Behavioural Insights Team - a UK-based ground-breaking pioneer in behaviour change economics. Informally known as the "Nudge Unit", The Behavioural Insights Team is a global social purpose organisation that generates and applies behavioural insights to inform policy and improve public services, following nudge theory.

Using social engineering, as well as techniques in behavioural economics. psychology, marketing, the purpose of the organisation is to influence public thinking and decision making in order to improve compliance with government policy and thereby decrease social government costs related to inaction and poor compliance with policy and regulation. The Behavioural Insights Team has been headed by British psychologist Mr. David Halpern since its formation in 2010.

At ISPP, Mr. Halpern was accompanied by Dr. Rory Gallagher, Managing Director of the Behavioural Insights Lab for Australia and Asia-Pacific. As expected, our scholars were delighted when this event was announced, and we saw a full house in terms of participation. Since behaviour change features prominently in the LokNeeti and PDM curricula, ISPP scholars were already acquainted with behaviour change concepts. Hence, Mr. Halpern's session went beyond the basics, providing deep insights into the subject. His talk enriched scholars' knowledge and understanding, better equipping them with valuable tools and perspectives to effect positive societal change.



### **Highlights of events**

From April to June 2023, the Indian School of Public Policy (ISPP) embarked on a remarkable journey of outreach events, embodying our vision of democratising public policy education and fostering impact across diverse audience segments.

With strategic planning and dedication, we tailored our outreach efforts to resonate with various groups. We sought to engage college graduates, such as those from prestigious institutions like Lucknow University, and mid-senior career professionals through a series of enriching policy workshops. In addition, we fostered partnerships with influential industry players like the Public Affairs Forum of India (PAFI).

To bring the essence of public policy closer to people's hearts, we branded all online sessions as "Policy & You". These sessions were thoughtfully curated, touching contemporary topics like "Towards a Smarter India: The Importance of Smarter Cities" and "Exploring Public Policy Communications in India." The response was overwhelming, with 221 active participants out of 531 registrations, boasting an impressive 41.7% participation rate. Our approach struck a chord with the target audience, as they found value in gaining insights and contributing to vital policy discussions.

Meanwhile, our physical events took on the identity of "ISPP Policy Relay," making their way to cities like Mumbai, Bengaluru, Lucknow and our campus in New Delhi. These dynamic gatherings comprised 11 interactive sessions in the form of workshops, panel discussions, and book talks. The topics addressed ranged from "Mapping the Frontier for Land Reform in India" to "Careers in public policy across samaaj, sarkaar and bazaar," and "Why Economics is Important for Public Policy".

Interestingly, both online and offline events indicated significant interest in the session focused on careers in public policy. This enthusiasm reinforces our belief that people are genuinely passionate about bringing about positive change through impactful policymaking.



#### Highlights

The Public Affairs Forum of India (PAFI) in partnership with ISPP, convened a roundtable dialogue on "Sustainability in Global Value Chain Management: Balancing Environmental Economic Goals" at the ISPP campus. Prominent experts and stakeholders engaged in a profound discussion on maintaining harmony between environmental preservation and economic imperatives in the global value chain.



# Stories of Change: Alumni

#### **UMESH JADHAV**

#### **Project Lead at International Innovation Corps**





Born and raised in the arid city of Himayat Nagar, Maharashtra, Umesh's life began against all odds. Hailing from a humble agrarian family, Umesh was fortunate to have a father who defied the norms and became the family's first graduate. His father's experience as a primary school teacher was pivotal in firing young Umesh's desire to contribute to nation-building and to instil the importance of education in him.

However, tragedy struck when, at 16, Umesh lost his father, his idol, to a road accident. His gravely injured mother was bedridden for six months. Soon after, he lost his grandmother. Umesh, the middle child, had to step in to support his family, including his younger sister's education, while keeping up with his studies. These incidents took a toll on his final exam results, but the ever-determined Umesh was admitted to an engineering college in Nagpur, where he studied IT. During this period, he volunteered with NGOs following Gandhian principles and philosophy. His determination inspired his mother to pursue her graduation, leading to the mother and son graduating together in 2014.

After college, he worked with the American firm, AT&T, but by now, he had firmly caught the development sector bug. Two years in, he transitioned to a rural NGO based in Gadchiroli, where he focused on tribal health. This was the turning point that reaffirmed his commitment to the development sector. After six years of working, Umesh knew this was the path he wanted to take, but he needed to formalise his education in public policy. Through first-hand experience, he realised the importance of good policy planning and implementation. All he needed now was to find sponsors willing to invest in him.

Fortunately, Umesh discovered ISPP. He was drawn to ISPP due to the incredible faculty members and curriculum, but his dreams could only be fulfilled with the generous scholarship that was offered to him. 


